



The Junior Chamber of Commerce sponsors an annual community swim meet at Miramonte.


Lions' Club has fostered creative talent by holding essay and public speaking contests: they also sponsor a service award each year.

A new group in the community, the Kiwanis Club, welcomes new teachers at a lunchean.






Thanks to a tremendous community effort, we have a swimming pool available for use by P.E. classes and school swim teams, as well as the Aquabears and the Orinda Recreation Department. Under the chairmanhing of Mrs. Robert Bowles, a fund drive raised over \$25,000 toward the completion of the pool. It was finished and ready for use on February 1, 1960.

In the spring of 1964 a drive was started for functions to erect foolball lights at Miramonte. Mr. Spenter Ancher and the Booster Club organized the drive; parents and other interested groups bought boads and provided jabs for work-weekends. In September of 1965 the project was completed. That fall we played our first game under the lights.
